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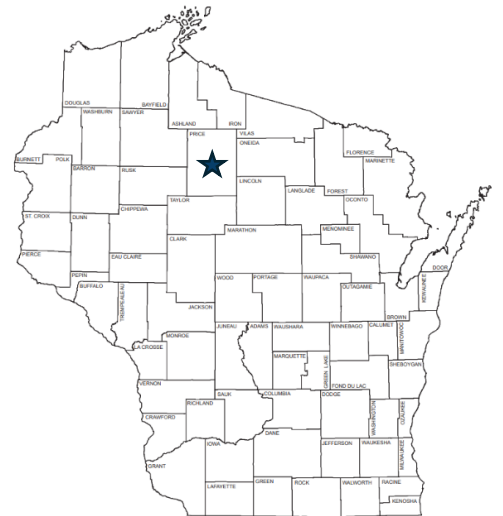
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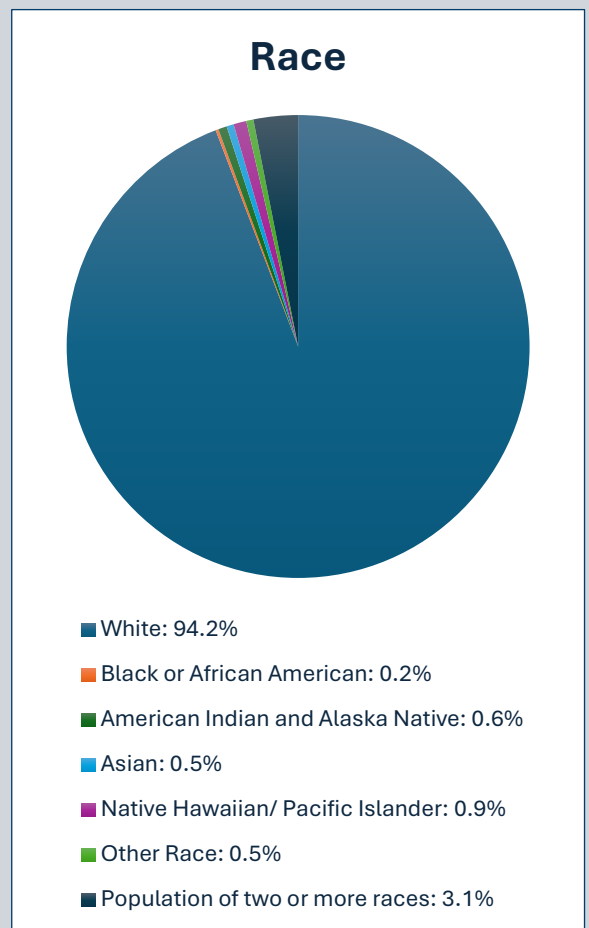
A Snapshot of Price County

Price County has 1,254.1 square miles of land area and is geographically the sixth largest county in the state. It includes two cities, three villages, and 17 townships. The major industries are manufacturing and engineering, farming, forestry, and construction. Additional industries include tourism, government services, and healthcare.

Price County had a total population of 14,054 in 2020 and is 100% rural with on average 11.2 persons per square mile.

Price County Public Health

- ▶ Public Health, as a unit of Health and Human Services, has a primary office in Phillips with satellite offices in Park Falls and Prentice.
- ▶ The Public Health unit employs approximately 9 staff, including a Health Officer, Registered Nurses, Registered Dietitian, Program Coordinator, and Administrative Support.

Assessing and Prioritizing the Health of our Community

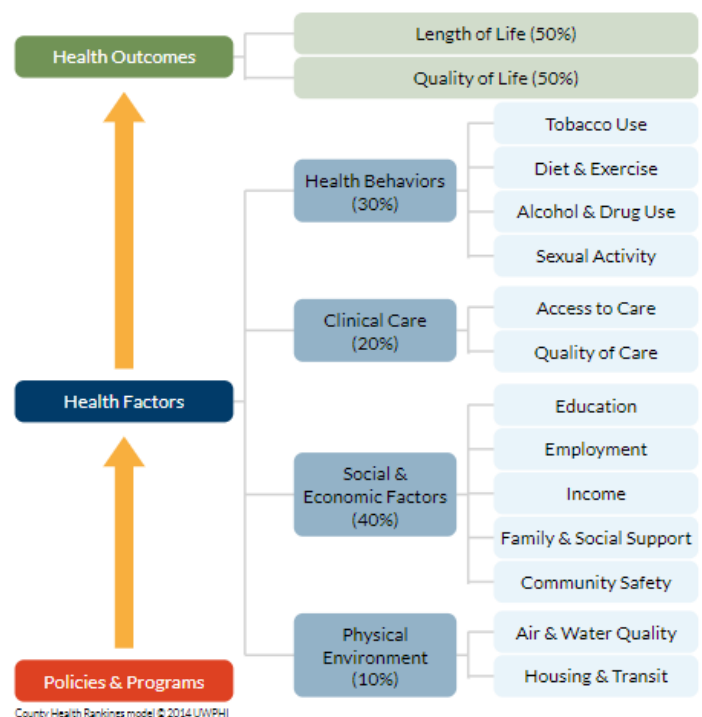
Every three years, Price County Public Health engages with community partners in community health improvement planning and processes (CHIPP). The two components of CHIPP include the community health assessment (CHA) and the community health improvement plan (CHIP).

The CHA includes collecting current data on health trends, analyzing the data to identify and prioritize health issues affecting our community, and choosing strategies to alleviate these factors. The identified goals and strategies are then outlined in the CHIP.

Data Collection

Primary data collection began with a community health survey in the fall of 2023 (Appendix A). The survey asked residents to evaluate health outcomes and behaviors that were of most concern to them and positive factors contributing to the health of the community. Concerted efforts for community participation were made by providing surveys at community events with varying age populations to developing Spanish versions for businesses with a high minority population. Approximately 200 Price County residents responded to the anonymous survey.

With assistance from the Wisconsin Institute for Public Policy and Service (WIPPS), secondary source data were collected from a variety of publicly available local, state, and federal sources. The 2023 UW Population Health Institute County Health Rankings Report served as the main source of secondary data used in the CHA.



Prioritization Process

In February 2024, Price County Public Health met with local stakeholders to review the results of the data collection process. Stakeholders included members of Price County Health and Human Services, Price County Health and Wellness Coalition, Price County Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA)/Mental Health Coalition, Price County Board Supervisor, Marshfield Medical Center, Aspirus Clinic, public schools, law enforcement, the local library, Chamber of Commerce, and City Administration.

Findings and analyses of the community survey and secondary source data were presented by WIPPS. Possible priority areas were selected based on whether they were: identified as among the areas of most concern in the community survey and/or the secondary source data indicated that Price County's outcomes were different from state or national estimates. The priority areas were organized into the County Health Rankings Model framework (Appendix B). Prior to voting on the priority areas to focus on over the next three years, community strengths identified by residents in the community health survey were shared with the stakeholders (Appendix C).

Priorities Selected

Based on the information presented, stakeholders individually voted on their top three priorities. Results of the vote were as follows:

When looking at an ethnic breakdown of survey results, priority concerns were similar to the overall findings. The greatest strengths of the community that were highlighted included low levels of crime, low levels of discrimination and harassment, and respecting cultural differences.



The following priorities were selected for the 2025-2027 CHA/CHIP:

- ▶ Mental Health, including access to providers
- ▶ Alcohol and other drug abuse
- ▶ Chronic disease

MENTAL HEALTH

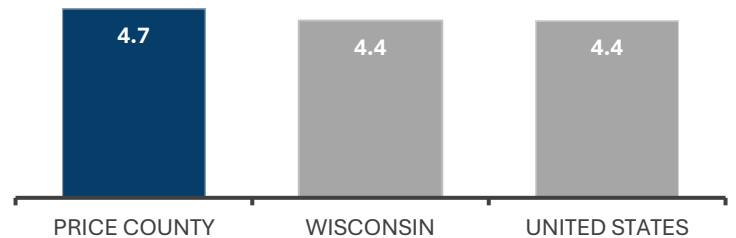
Key Findings & Data Highlights

40% of survey respondents believe that mental health is the *health outcome* of most concern, reflecting the combination of poor mental health (depression, anxiety, etc.) with 32% of responses and increased rates of suicide and self-harm with 8% of responses.

15% of Price County adults report experiencing 14+ days of frequent mental distress on a monthly basis. (2023 County Health Rankings)

Price County adults report experiencing 4.7 mentally unhealthy days per month.

(2023 County Health Rankings)



20% of survey respondents identify poor mental health and 5% identify intentional injuries (self-harm, suicide) as *health behaviors* of concern.

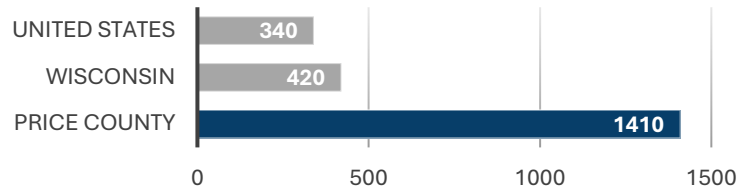
68% of Price County Middle School and 57% of Price High School students answered affirmatively to at least one question on the 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey with respect to experiencing problems with anxiety, feeling so sad or helpless that they stopped their usual activities, engaging in self-harm, making a suicide plan, or attempting suicide.

22% of survey respondents identify lack of mental health providers as the highest concern for *clinical care issues*.

When asked to identify community strengths from among a list of 25 options, 0% of survey respondents selected “access to mental health care” or “mental health and well-being”.

There are 1,410 residents to every one mental health provider in Price County.

(2023 County Health Rankings)



15% of survey respondents identify “social media hurting mental health” as a *social and economic factor* of concern.



MENTAL HEALTH

Contributing Factors

- ▶ Low Income:
 - Price County’s median household income is about 16% below the state and 19% below the national median income levels. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- ▶ Access to care:
 - Lack of mental health providers: 1,410:1 in Price County vs. 340:1 nationally)
 - While more than 93% of adults and 95% of children in Price County are covered by insurance, “affordable health insurance” accounted for 20% of responses about the clinical care issues of most concern to residents in the community health survey. (2023 County Health Rankings, 2023 Community Health Survey)
 - Price County is a rural community requiring individuals to travel longer distances to appointments. Furthermore, limited access to public transportation accounted for 15% of responses about the physical environment issues of most concern to residents.
 - Limited internet access further restricts appointment options, such as telehealth, for many Price County residents. Internet access accounted for 15% of responses for physical environment concerns. Based on the 2023 County Health Rankings, only 78% of Price County households have broadband internet connection compared to 86% statewide and 87% nationally.

ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG ABUSE

Key Findings & Data Highlights

29% of survey respondents identify drug abuse as a *health behavior* of most concern.

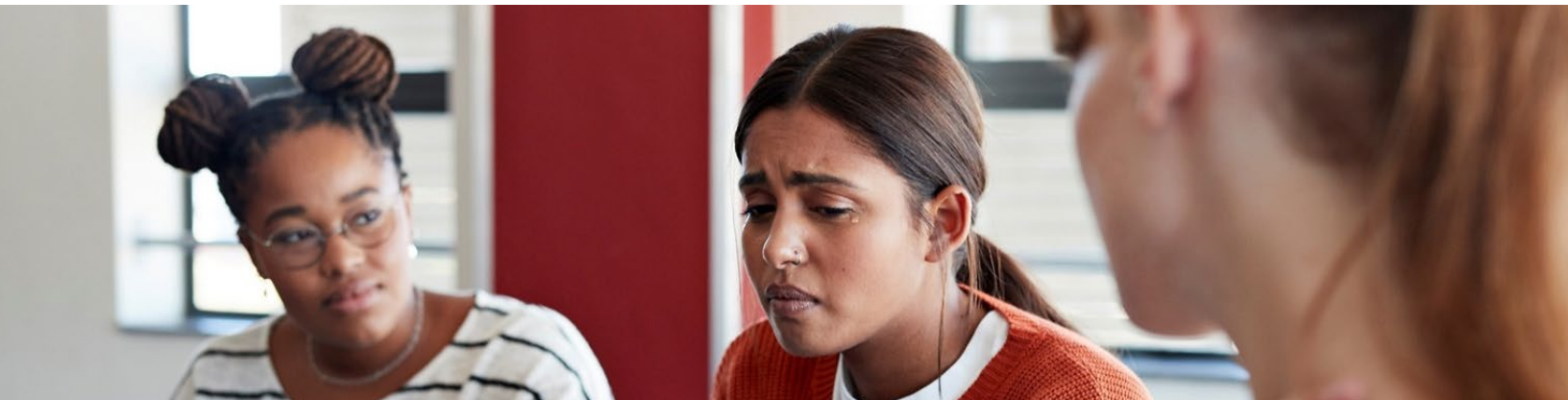
- Drug-related poisoning/overdose deaths (age-adjusted rates per 100,000): Price 17, Wisconsin 22.
- Drug-related hospitalizations (age-adjusted rates per 100,000): Price County 57, Wisconsin 72.
- Drug-related emergency room visits (age-adjusted rates per 100,000): Price 158, Wisconsin 182.
- 20% of Price County high school students who took the 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey reported that they tried marijuana; 10% reporting using marijuana in the month before the survey. 13% reported they had misused a prescription pain medication

11% of survey respondents identify alcohol use/misuse as a *health behavior* of concern.

- About 43% of driving deaths in Price County involve alcohol impairment, compared to 36% statewide and 27% nationally. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- 26% of Price County adults report binge or heavy drinking. This compares to the state level of 26% but is higher than the national level of 19%. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- 60% of high school students reported that they have tried alcohol on the 2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey. 37% reported drinking in the month before the survey. 17% reported binge drinking in the month before the survey. (2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey)
- Chronic liver disease and cirrhosis are among the top 5 leading causes of death for those under age 75 in Price County.

6% of survey respondents identify tobacco, vaping, and e-cigarettes as a *health behavior* of concern.

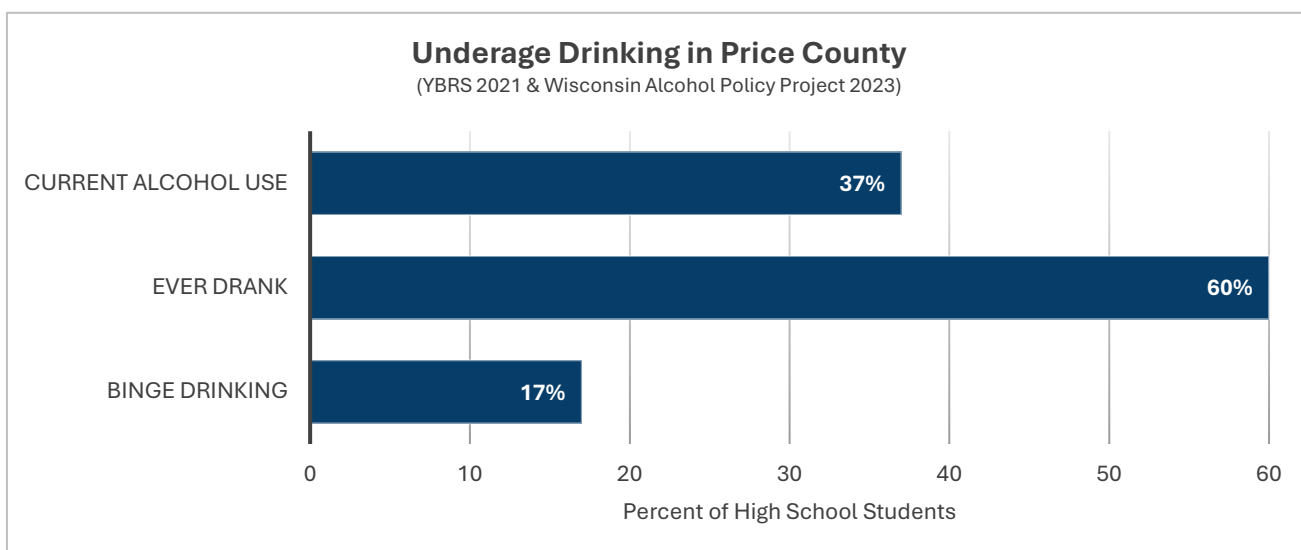
- 20% of Price County adults are smokers, compared to 16% statewide and nationally. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- 12% of high school students reported smoking cigarettes within the last 30 days as compared to 5% statewide. (2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 2021 County Health Rankings)
- 23% of high school students reported vaping within the last 30 days as compared to 15% statewide. (2021 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, 2021 County Health Rankings)



ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG ABUSE

Contributing Factors

- ▶ **Low Income:**
 - Price County’s median household income is about 16% below the state and 19% below the national median income levels. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- ▶ **Access to care:** Limited substance use counselors and lack of facilities in the county.
 - Two counseling centers in the county have AODA/Substance Use Counselors.
 - The closest detox facility is in Ashland County. It has limited access as it shares space with their inpatient Behavioral Health Unit and is only for adults.
 - The nearest residential treatment facility is in Oneida County.
- ▶ **Cultural Influence:**
 - For the years 2020-2021, Price County had 86 alcohol licenses and 158.69 people per license whereas the State of Wisconsin had 345 people per license (WI DHS Environmental Public Health Data Tracker)
 - Drinking is normalized, alcohol is present at various community events and activities, binge or heavy drinking are considered socially acceptable, and stigma exists toward those that do not drink alcohol, or it can be uncomfortable for those who abstain from or do not drink alcohol. (Key findings from 2023 Wisconsin Alcohol Policy Project’s focus group regarding issues related to alcohol use in Price County)
 - The Wisconsin Alcohol Policy Project further identified concerns about youth related to learning drinking behavior from multi-generational family members, the impact of parental attitudes on drinking behavior for youth, and kids drinking at parties. (Key findings from 2023 Wisconsin Alcohol Policy Project’s focus group regarding issues related to alcohol use in Price County)

CHRONIC DISEASE

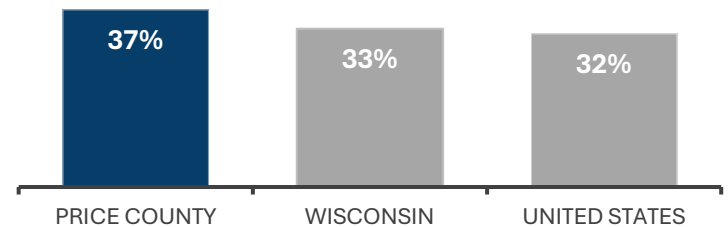
Key Findings & Data Highlights

43% of survey respondents believe that chronic disease, obesity, and lack of physical activity as a *health outcome* of most concern, reflecting the combination of obesity or lack of physical activity with 24% of responses and chronic disease (diabetes, heart disease, etc.) with 19% of responses.

21% of Price County adults report engaging in no leisure time physical activity (age-adjusted). (2023 County Health Rankings)

The percentage Price County adults who have a BMI greater or equal to 30kg/m² is higher than State and National levels.

(2023 County Health Rankings)



14% of respondents find “access to healthy foods” to be a *physical environment factor* of concern.

10% of Price County’s population is defined as having “food insecurity” or inadequate access to food.
5% of low-income residents do not live close to a grocery store. (2023 County Health Rankings)

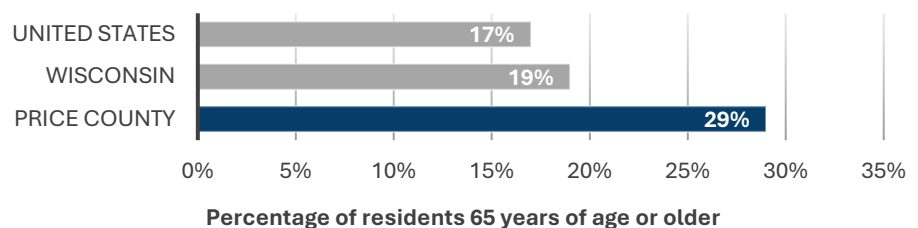
18% of survey respondents identify “access to healthy recreational activities (walking, biking, parks)” as a *physical environment factor* of concern.

65% of Price County residents have adequate access to locations for physical activity (living close to a park or recreation facility) compared to 84% statewide and nationally. (2023 County Health Rankings)

Social and economic factors of most concern to survey respondents included: aging-related concerns with 19% of responses and family issues (absent parents, aging relatives) with 18% of responses.

Price County has an older population as compared to the state and national levels.

(2023 County Health Rankings)



16% of survey respondents identify “lack of open appointments to get into healthcare providers” as a *clinical care issue* of most concern.

As of 2023, there are 13,250 residents to every one primary care physician in Price County as compared to 1,310:1 nationally. (2023 County Health Rankings)

- ▶ Low Income
 - Price County’s median household income is about 16% below the state and 19% below the national median income levels. (2023 County Health Rankings)
- ▶ Aging population
 - 29% of Price County residents are 65 years of age or older (2023 County Health Rankings).
- ▶ Access to care:
 - Lack of Primary Care Physicians: 13,250:1 in Price County (2023 County Health Rankings)
 - Lack of Primary Care Providers (nurse practitioners, physicians assistants, and clinical nurse specialists who can provide routine and preventative care. Price County 1,000:1, Wisconsin 720:1, United States 810:1. (2023 County Health Rankings)
 - While more than 93% of adults and 95% of children in Price County are covered by insurance, “affordable health insurance” accounted for 20% of responses about the clinical care issues of most concern to residents in the community health survey. (2023 County Health Rankings, 2023 Community Health Survey)
 - Price County is a rural community requiring individuals to travel longer distances to appointments. Furthermore, limited access to public transportation accounted for 15% of responses about the physical environment issues of most concern to residents.
 - Limited internet access further restricts appointment options, such as telehealth, for many Price County residents. Internet access accounted for 15% of responses for physical environment concerns. Based on the 2023 County Health Rankings, only 78% of Price County households have broadband internet connection compared to 86% statewide and 87% nationally.
- ▶ Access to affordable and healthy foods
 - 10% of Price County’s population is defined as having “food insecurity” or inadequate access to food. (2023 County Health Rankings)

Areas Not Selected as Top Priorities

We acknowledge that all areas that were identified as possible priorities are important, many of these are contributing factors to the three selected priorities. While not identified as a top priority, they will be considered when looking at objectives and strategies for our overall goals.

These include factors such as: access to affordable health care and providers, aging-related concerns, public transportation, and internet access.

The next steps will include:

- ▶ Collaborating with community partners through the coalitions
- ▶ Developing a three-year community health improvement plan
- ▶ Integrating the health priorities and implementation strategies into organizational strategic planning and resource investments and allocations
